

Confederate Names Given Four Cantonment Camps

Washington, July 18.—Four of the thirty-two cantonments to be established for training troops will bear the names of former Confederate commanders. In choosing names the war college has obliterated all sectional considerations and has sought only to honor American military ability wherever it has been exhibited.

In the list of names announced tonight, Lee, Gordon, Beauregard and Wheeler, take their places beside Grant, Sherman, Sheridan, Meade and more than a score of others who fought for the Union.

Brig. Gen. Joseph E. Kuhn tonight stated that every attempt had been made to select names which would be popular in the vicinity of the camps.

"Effort has been made," he said "to select names of Federal commanders for camps of divisions from Northern States and of Confederate commanders for camps of divisions from Southern States."

The names of the camps follow:

ONCE BIG MUSICAL CENTER IS NOW MILITARY FIELD
